2026 PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION FOR DISABLED VETERANS AND THEIR SURVIVORS

The home must be owned and occupied as the established residence of the veteran/survivor.

The State of Vermont offers a property tax reduction on the appraisal value of the **primary residence** of eligible veterans and their survivors. The amount of the reduction varies from \$10,000 - \$40,000. Please contact your city or town clerk for property tax related information or questions.

- **Non-Qualified Property:** Includes land only, second homes, vacation or summer cottages, and any part used for business or rental.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

To be eligible for the exemption, **Veterans** must meet one of the three criteria listed below:

- Receive Disability Compensation for a service-connected disability rated 50% or higher by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.
- Receive Improved Pension (also called Non-Service Connected Disability Pension) from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs.
- Receive a permanent medical retirement from the military.

To be eligible for the exemption, **Survivors** must be the unmarried spouse or a minor child of a veteran who met the eligibility criteria above at the time of their death.

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Complete the Applicant Information portion of the form for disabled veterans or their survivors.
2. Read the Signature portion. Sign and date the form.
3. Mail, email, or fax the form, along with the applicable documentation (see below), to the Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs for the reduction to apply. Please do not drop these off at your town clerk's office.
4. Applicants must submit this form and documentation every year by **MAY 1st**, except for individuals meeting the One-Time Filing criteria listed at the bottom.

If your application is **received after May 1st** you may apply to your town's Board of Abatement for abatement of municipal taxes under [24 V.S.A. §1535\(a\)\(6\)](#).

DOCUMENTATION

All applications **must include** documentation to verify eligibility. The verification documents are issued either by the U.S. Dept. of Veterans Affairs (U.S. VA) or the Department of Defense (DoD).

U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs

Eligibility based on receipt of disability compensation rated 50% or higher, or receipt of Improved Pension, is verified by the U.S. VA. Please send the **2026** Summary of Benefits letter with your application; they are generally available in January of each year. Download your benefit letter at www.va.gov/records/download-va-letters/ or call (800) 827-1000 or (866) 687-8387 ext. 5335 or to request it.

Department of Defense

Eligibility based on **permanent** military retirement for medical reasons is verified by submitting a DD Form 214 that shows the veteran was medically retired, or a copy of the medical retirement letter.

PRIVACY

The Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs does not need any additional information other than what is listed above. We do not need information on payments the veteran receives. Applicants are free to request documents from the U.S. VA that limits the information included. In addition, applicants are free to black out payment amounts on the provided documentation before submitting to the Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs.

The Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs will only provide the Vermont Department of Taxes and towns with the name, address, and SPAN of approved applicants.

ONE-TIME FILING

With written proof from the U.S. VA, the following individuals only have to apply once as their eligibility will not change. The one-time filing must be approved by the Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs.

- Veterans who have been designated totally and permanently disabled by the U.S. VA.
- Veterans who have had a disability compensation rating of 50% or higher for 10 consecutive years.
- Veterans who received a **permanent** medical retirement.
- Surviving spouses (eligibility will only change if they remarry; it is the responsibility of the surviving spouse to notify the Vermont Office of Veterans Affairs if they remarry).
